STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME (SLO):

Examine and synthesize the social, cultural, and physiological implications in the field of human sexuality; and demonstrate the ability to analyze and respond to complex issues related to human sexuality in all assignments.

Course Objectives • Course Information:

- A. Examine the field of human development as a behavioral science and its interdisciplinary components, the inter-relationships between the cognitive and affective domains and their impact on behavior.
- B. Identify the major components of the male and female sexual anatomy and explain the physiological processes that mediate sexual activity using the language of the human development discipline, to include the concept of gender.
- C. Compare and contrast the various contraception methods currently available for men and women; history of contraception to include natural and surgical methods, as well as historical and cross-cultural views on abortion as a form of contraception.
- D. Describe psycho-physical and psycho-social changes that occur at each stage of sexual development (birth, early childhood, pre-teen, adolescence) to include hygiene and sex education.
- E. Identify the main categories of sexual behavior and recognize their biological, psychological, and cultural determinants.
- F. Illustrate global perspectives on cultural diversity within the discipline using a variety of multicultural/multiethnic examples.
- G. Recognize the incidence, symptoms, causes, treatment, and prevention of major sexual infections as well as attitudes, myths, and stereotypes.
- H. Analyze, interpret, examine, and draw conclusions from evidence and current perspectives regarding the impact of media and morality as it pertains to sexual behavior.
- I. Analyze patterns of various sexual relationships and interactions from a multicultural perspective such as dating, cohabitation, marriage, and divorce.
- J. Compare given sets of criteria upon which ethical, moral, judgments, and decisions about sexual behavior and responsibility are made.

Note: Material that may be considered controversial and explicit topics and lifestyles will be presented in the textbook, readings and online discussions, videos, and presentations.

- Skim each chapter for history, perspective, facts, and changing beliefs over time, culture, and the increase of scientific knowledge, together with competing beliefs and understanding.
- Concentrate on areas of interest to you, areas covered in our zoom sessions and our Canvas course, and areas in current events.

METHODOLOGY:

This is a fully online course with zoom meetings, Wednesdays 9:30am-10:20am.

Use of a computer and printer should be accessible for assignments (research, typing, and printing) and for the online textbook, if one wishes to use a digital version (REVEL or e-book). A physical version of the textbook is also available, if preferred. Assignments are to be submitted by their respective due dates, typed, or word-processed using Arial Font size 12, black ink and submitted within each respective Canvas assignment.

Certain assignments will involve having conversations with others, some in the zoom sessions with the instructor and fellow students, and others with individuals outside the course (Decades Project); the assignment instructions will specify.

Note, all submitted/typed assignments are to be typed in Arial Font, Size 12 and submitted in each Canvas assignment. Pay attention to due dates and time: assignments are due on a specific Tuesday and must be submitted no later than the final due date specified. (Early submission of assignments is encouraged). The Midterm and Final Exam will take place in Canvas; follow the instructions and guidelines carefully.

Note: Below are the basic types of assignments for which students are responsible. There will be additional assignments which will also earn points. Therefore, the total points available will be in excess of 500 (extra credit assignments and extra credit built into the assignments below). [This is instructor does not use "+","-" grades, nor does the instructor report grades in percentages. Ignore percentage reporting in Canvas.]

Each student is encouraged to be actively involved from the first day of the course. Challenges occur in life. Having a strong start and throughout the course will permit more options should difficulties become more overwhelming. Once 325 total points is reached, a grade of "C" is earned. A grade of "C" is the minimum grade required to pass the course, as well as the minimum grade for a course to be transferred to other colleges and universities. Aim for a grade of "A" (450 points); it is available for all. Each student earns their grade. Submit assignments timely, with quality, pride, respect, and responsibility. The more one puts into a project, the more one learns and gains knowledge to apply to life.

Important grading notes:

All work in this class must be typed/word processed using black, Arial Font, Size 12, paragraph format, double-spaced, using formal tone and language (no lists, no italic, no bold). Assignments are graded on quality, supported facts, clarity. Facts and analysis are to be written in "Third-Person" Supported personal analysis and opinions should be provided at the end of the assignment in separate paragraphs, using "First-person" formal tone and language. There should be a clear, logical development of all information. Answer questions in the order asked. Answer questions, as asked. Stay on topic/focus. Any personal knowledge examples are to be detailed at the end of the assignment in separate paragraphs.

• All work is to be paraphrased. No quotes. No plagiarism. Plagiarized work will earn a grade of "0"/F for that assignment. All data and unique statements are to have sources cited (author, year), with the full citation provided at the end of the assignment.

CREDIT IS BASED UPON:

- Satisfactory performance on the exams (up to 100 points per exam)
- Participation in zoom dialogues and discussions, including with the instructor and fellow students.
- Completion of two major assignments, Autobiography and The Decades Project, and several smaller reports. Ask the instructor for clarifications.
- Extra credit assignments are built into the Canvas course and assigned to everyone in the class. Individual extra credit assignments are not an option.
- All points earned will be counted towards the official course grade. Each student earns their grade.
 - Note: Not required: Completion of "Chapter Review Quizzes" within our Revel textbook course
 - points earned in Revel quizzes are for information only and do not affect the course grade.
- Choosing not to complete assignments is choosing not to earn points toward the final course grade.

POINT ALLOCATION:

- All assignments are to be submitted before the due dates to ensure earning a higher grade; planning to wait until a due date often leads to late assignments and lower grades (late = non-graded).
 - An opportunity to submit an assignment "early" for extra credit points may built into a few specific assignments.
 - Read instructions and grading rubrics carefully, rewards for early submission may apply.
- It is the student's responsibility to verify that the instructor has received and graded all of their work.
- Assignments and Examinations will be graded as soon as possible.
- Errors in grading should be brought to the instructor's attention within seven days of return and may initiate re-grading of the entire exam or assignment.
- After the final exam, all points earned will be added into the grand total and course grades will be assigned, as letter grades "A", "B", "C", "D", or "F". (see grading scale)
 - Pay attention to your individual assignment and Total Points of all scores
 - o NOTE: Gades are based upon "Total Points; not as percentile scores in this course.
 - Reminder: Points earned in the Revel textbook course are for information purposes only and are not added to compute the course grade.
- Manage your time wisely to submit assignments timely and well (follow instructions, guidelines, and grading rubrics to earn a higher grade).
- No extensions to any due date and/or due time; there is sufficient time allocated for each assignment.
- If a student has any questions or concerns, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor.
- If a student chooses to drop the class, the student must officially drop the class via the Office of Admissions and Records, or on MyPortal, or risk receiving a grade of F.

Work consistently throughout the course. Plan your time wisely. Read each textbook chapter, read, plan, and work the course assignments. The "Decades Project" will take several weeks for conversations, consideration, and preparation of the report. For all assignments, read all instructions and guidelines, as well as Rubrics (grading rules) [re-read, as necessary]. Ask the instructor timely for clarification of assignments, due dates, as well as feedback received. The instructor cares and wants to help in a timely manner; complaining a day or several weeks after a due date, or after the end of the course, is not helpful. No extensions, no exceptions, to due dates or times; pay attention; plan wisely; read all emails and listen to announcements. Late assignments are not graded. Be proactive. Working "last minute" is not helpful.
