Course Description and Objective:

This course delves deeply into the intricate world of ceramic hand building, catering to students with prior experience or a strong foundation in pottery. Through a fusion of theory and practice, participants will expand their repertoire of techniques, pushing the boundaries of clay manipulation and artistic expression.

Students will explore hand building methods such as pinch, coil, and slab-built ceramic work as well as complex surface decoration techniques. Emphasis will be placed on refining craftsmanship, honing attention to detail, and cultivating a distinctive artistic voice.

Drawing inspiration from historical and contemporary ceramic artists, students will engage in critical discourse to deepen their understanding of ceramic aesthetics and conceptual frameworks. Through critiques and peer feedback sessions, students will develop their ability to articulate artistic intentions and engage in constructive dialogue within the ceramic community.

The course will also look at practical considerations such as glaze chemistry, kiln firing techniques, and studio safety protocols, empowering students with comprehensive knowledge to execute their creative visions effectively.

By the culmination of the course, students will have produced a cohesive body of work that reflects their artistic evolution and technical proficiency in ceramic hand building. Whether aspiring towards professional practice or seeking to deepen their artistic exploration, this course equips students with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to excel in the dynamic realm of ceramic art.

Student Learning Outcome Statement (SLO):

- Demonstrate competency in hand construction techniques; pinch, coil, slab.
- Demonstrate competency in glaze and slip application

Required Materials: Notebook at least 8"

Criteria for Evaluation: A high degree of commitment to this class is expected. Your presence, persistence, imagination, attention to detail, and level of involvement will help to determine the quality of your work.

Projects will be graded according to the following criteria:

15% for work made in greenware (clay forms that are unfired)

15% for work made and bisqued (clay forms that have gone through the 1st firing process)

20% for work glazed fired (clay forms that have gone through both firings and are glazed)

15% for craftsmanship (attention to detail and quality of work)

20% for execution of technique (proper construction, decoration, and glazing techniques used)

15% for creativity

ARTS 18 D Assignments

1. Pinch Pots (Weeks 1-3) (30 pts.)

- A. Tea Ceremony Bowl for Winter (worth 10 points)
- B. Create a lidded container for tea (Tea Caddy) (worth 10 points)
- C. Design a small sculptural form (worth 10 points)

2. Ceramic Slabs (Weeks 3-7) (35 pts.)

- Create bisque molds for press plates. (worth 10)
- Produce 6 matching plates incorporating 3 decoration techniques. (each Plate worth 5 pts.)

3. Coil-Built Form (Weeks 5-7) (30 pts.)

- Craft an Onggi vessel with the following requirements:
- The largest dimension must be between 10 to 14 inches.
- The smallest dimension must be between 8 to 12 inches.
- Paddle the coils.
- Decorate the surface with white slip and glaze it with clear.

4. Kurinuki Box (Weeks 7-9) (30 pts.)

- A box carved from a solid block of clay
- The box must include a sunk in gallery and flanged lid
- Liquid latex will be used for the gallery and lid

5. Sculpture (Weeks 8-12, Final) (50 pts.)

- Create a sculpture incorporating multiple components and utilizing slab built construction techniques and at least 1 of the other techniques present in the prior 5 assignments.

Bonus: **Porcelain Carved Box** (Weeks 3-12) (25 bonus points available)
