Course Meeting Times:

4 hours lecture (48 hours total per quarter).

This is an asynchronous class. meaning there is no set time students are required to log in. Instead students should log in at least once a week to complete all course work at their own convenience.

Course Description:

A comprehensive introduction to contemporary trends, styles and applications of photography starting in 1925. An examination of photography's broad impact as a cultural, visual and social force including the diversity of 20th and 21st Century photographic movements

- 2. Recognize and appreciate the wide range of ethnically, culturally, and socially diversere presentations and practices in contemporary photography.
- 3. Evaluate and critique contemporary photographic imagery as a powerful medium of visual communication, through discussion, observation, and writing.

- *Some of the subject matter within the textbook and covered in class may be considered controversial ore xplicit (for depictions of violence, nudity, politically controversial, or images that are sexual in nature). Students should be aware there are some graphic images that will be shown in the textbook as well as in class.

Methods of Evaluating Course Objectives:

Weekly, short examinations (written and multiple choice) on weekly textbook readings, assigned readings and video lectures (when applicable).

- ❖ 1 multiple choice midterm exam, and 1 multiple choice and final exam with written portion
- ❖ 1 Research paper (6 pages minimum), and working outline for such a project, involving summary, synthesis, and critical analysis of material.
- ❖ Written critique(s) requiring the student to analyze, summarize and also interpret works viewed with materials covered in class.
- Several creative shooting assignments using a camera to demonstrate students' understanding of artistic movements.
- ❖Participation in and contribution toward classroom discussion(s).

Assignments & Exams:

- 1 multiple choice midterm exam, and 1 multiple choice final exam (approximately 20-points for each exam)
- Bi- Weekly assignments: there will be two weekly assignments alongside the research paper, the field trip response and final exams. Weekly assignments will consist of one of the following:
 - O A written and multiple choice quiz on course materials. (5- 12 points each)
 - O Photography Creative Assignments; several small creative assignments, requires any camera (can be a phone camera): 10 points each
 - A written reading response on one of the non-textbook readings- 10 points each
- 1 Photography Book Review: 30 points. In lieu of visiting a photography exhibit (which is assigned most terms)- students will review a book of photography. More details can be found on canvas.
- Research Paper: 6 pages (or 1500 word minimum) Further description will be given when assigned (85 points)

Academic Dishonesty:

Students who cheat on exams, quizzes or any other means of evaluation will receive an F on the assignment. Names of students found cheating may be forwarded to the appropriate college authorities. Plagiarism and cheating are taken as serious offenses. Please see the section below for a full description of academic dishonesty, and the possible consequences.

Plagiarism and Working in Class:

: the act of using another person's words or ideas without giving credit to that person : the act of plagiarizing something-the Merriam/ Webster dictionary

Here are a few examples of plagiarism that relate to this course:

- Copying and pasting work from other sources without using quotation marks and citing
 your sources. This is plagiarism- whether it is an entire paper, one passage, or a portion of
 a statement.
- Having someone else write your papers or responses for you and then taking credit for their work. All work should be your own analysis, in your own words.
- Submitting images for creative assignments that you did not take yourself.

Plagiarism is a serious offense. In most schools and workplaces, plagiarism results in expulsion. Please avoid getting in the habit of using others' work without attributing credit to the correct

author. Any work that is lifted from another source, without being correctly cited, will receive an F(0%) on the assignment. Resubmissions for plagiarized work will not be accepted.

In Class Etiquette:

Students are expected to demonstrate thoughtfulness and consideration to their class mates and the instructor.

Late Work:

Due to the extenuating circumstances students might face due to the shelter in place order, the instructor will grant deadline extensions for most assignments that meet the following criteria:

- The deadline extension is requested near the original assignment deadline.
- Students must complete the first assignment and the Imaginary Show/ Research Paper by the deadlines stated on canvas. The instructor is unable to grant deadlines for these two assignments.
- The instructor may decline to grant deadline extensions if a student has asked for more than 3 consecutive deadline extensions.

Class Deadlines:

Students will be given ample time to complete their work. Homework and classwork deadlines are final, and work submitted after the deadline will receive a 0.

Attendance:

Attendance will be taken by recording a students online activity, and by completion of 1 assignment in the first 2 weeks. Students who do not log into the course canvas site and attend the lab within the first two weeks may be dropped from the class. Students who do not log into the course canvas site for over 4 weeks maybe withdrawn from the class by the instructor.

The Course Canvas Site:

Students will be taking quizzes, submitting small assignments and reviewing video lectures through canvas. It is the student's responsibility to know their login information for the De Anza Canvas site after the first week of class.

Materials and Costs:

Students will need access to a computer, and the internet.

Students will be required to complete several creative projects that require access to a digital camera. Phone cameras are acceptable, and no technical knowledge of a camera is required.

Posting Grades:

Students Should be able to view grades on the canvas site. Any grade that has not been entered yet will be posted as a "-".

Most often, assignments will be graded within a week of their submission. Due to extended deadlines given to some students, grades for any assignment may take up to 3 weeks to complete from the date it is submitted by a student.

Grading:

Small Assignments (worth 10 points) will be graded the following way;

No Credit: No submission, late submissions or less than half the assignment is complete. Also students who plagiarize will receive no credit.

Half Credit: More than half the assignment is complete- but the assignment is not fully completed.

Full Credit: The assignment is thoughtfully, and fully completed on time.

Large Assignments (any assignment besides quizzes and tests worth more than 10 points).

Large Assignments (more than 10 points in value) and weekly quizzes will receive a letter grade. Specific assignment grading rubrics will be provided as assignments are assigned.* Written reading responses and quizzes are not graded on the half credit/ no credit/ full credit basis.

Please read assignment instructions carefully. Weekly quizzes, reading response and research papersare meant to cultivate analysis and understanding of course material. While I encourage students to do outside research (in addition to demonstrating understanding of course material), the majority of assignments should reflect material covered in the course. Assignment submissions that do not followssignment instructions, or do not relate to course material will receive a 0.

Examples for written work should be directly related to photography:

Particularly in the beginning of the course, we will be looking at how photography developed alongside other media like painting, and sculpture. However, unless specified otherwise in the assignment directions, please keep all examples - in essays, responses and quiz questions-photography related. Although examples do not have to be direct photographs (examples can encompass collage, found images and photo- realist paintings that use photographs as a source material) there needs to be a direct relation between the work and photography as a medium.
