How this Class Works

- This is a 12-week **online** course worth 5 credits. Expect to spend at least 10 hours doing tasks on Canvas and reading course material each week.
- You will learn in a community with your peers. *This is not a self-paced course*.
- By Sunday at the end of Week 1, you will be expected to log in to our course in Canvas and complete the Week 1 Module. If you don't log in during Week 1, you may lose your spot in the class to a student on the waitlist.

Course Description

EWRT 1A is an introduction to university-level reading and writing (5 units) with an emphasis on analysis. We will closely examine a variety of texts (personal, popular, literary, professional, academic) from culturally diverse traditions.

We will practice common rhetorical strategies used in academic writing. We will compose clear, well-organized, and well-developed essays, with varying purposes and different audiences, from personal to academic.

This course is transferable to all UC, CSU, and private colleges.

Technology

Course Details:

EWRT 1A is an introduction to university-level reading and writing with an emphasis on analysis, we will move from personal analysis (Essay #1) to choosing a side in a debate (Essay#2) to analysis of characters in a novel and the analysis of a central theme in that novel, using a framing text to analyze that novel (Essay #3) to taking a stance on an issue (Essay #4). The questions about humanity, AI, and scientific exploration are endless, and the purpose of this class will be to debate and discuss big ideas in a safe, respectful way; and to learn to read literature within a sociological, ethical, and philosophical framework. This class will improve communication skills, literacy, and critical thinking. We will write four formal papers -one timed essay and three academic essays. Students must write and submit ALL of the formal essays to possibly pass this course.

Student Learning Outcome (SLO):

- Practice writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies.
- Read and analyze rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.

Course Requirements

Students can expect instructor feedback on formal papers and assignments within a week of submission. All formal papers will be graded by a rubric, which is included and available as the assignment becomes available. Papers are graded in terms of sophistication of content and argument; clarity of organization; fluidity of expression through sentence structure; fluency of grammar, punctuation, and spelling; and adherence to MLA format. Please understand that the grade you receive and the feedback I give on each paper is to help you write future papers and decide which papers to include in the portfolio. It is your job to revise as you see fit, with the help of a tutor if needed.

Each tutorial supports one chapter from the *They Say/I Say* eBook and guides students to read, recognize the moves, and write papers.

Turnitin

You will submit essays to Canvas with a tool called **turnitin.com**, which checks for plagiarism and also gives feedback on grammar. Please think of it as a tool that can help you become a stronger writer!

Formatting

Please use MLA formatting for essays. Include an MLA header with your name and date. Use a double-spaced 12-point font such as Arial, Palentino, or Times New Roman.

English 1A Formal ESSAY GUIDELINES:

- All essays must use MLA format
- Each essay must have your full name, due date and title on the first page.
- You must complete and submit ALL of the FOUR formal essays to possibly pass this course.

Late Work, Extensions, and Revisions

Late posts to Discussions might receive partial credit, but you will not receive credit for responses to Discussions that are submitted after the Discussion has closed.

Every assignment has a due date, rubric, and deadline for submissions. Participants are expected to submit assignments on or before the assigned due date, which, in turn, allows me time to review their work and provide meaningful feedback. Due dates have been designed in the course to ensure time is provided to allow you to produce your best work.

Time management is tough and life happens, so sometimes we miss deadlines! You're in luck: late submissions are accepted with a penalty. Assignments submitted after the deadline may receive a 10% grade point deduction for each day following the due date and time. If you need an extension for any formal assignment, please email me before the due date and I can work with you. Discussion due dates cannot be extended, due to their interactive nature.

There are no revisions after a submission has received a grade. Writing is a process of revision. I structure the course so that you have ample time to complete the necessary prewriting and reading and work with a tutor at the WRC BEFORE you submit each essay for a grade. I highly encourage you to go to the WRCLinks to an external site. or NetTutor to revise and proofread each essay before you submit it.

Our textbook, *They Say /I Say* offers this advice about the use of AI in a writing class: "After all, as you probably already know, it can be very tempting for students to turn in an AI-generated text as their own, to simply change a word or two and put their name on it. But the central message we want to offer on this topic is: don't. It's no more acceptable to submit the work of a bot as your own than it is to submit the work of another person as your own. Ultimately, plagiarizing is not only a way of cheating the academic system but also of cheating yourself, since it denies you the chance to develop the independent intellectual skills that you go to college to learn." If you do choose to use generative AI, follow MLA citation guidelines and submit a transcript or record of any interactions you had with generative AI in writing your essay. Read Chapter 19 for further discussion of this topic.
