Geography 10: WORLD REGIONAL GEOGRAPHY - ONLINE

COURSE DESCRIPTION: An introduction to the major distinctive regions of the world; their natural environment, people, resources, agriculture, manufacturing, trade, cities and the problems relating to contemporary society in each of the regions. Understanding the increasing interdependencies among and between regions.

Requisites: Advisory: EWRT 1A or EWRT 1AH or ESL 5; MATH 210 or equivalent. 4 units

- A. Examine the basic themes and traditions in geography. Compare and contrast the two main branches of geography (physical and cultural/ human). Summarize the relationship of cultural/ human geography to the other social sciences. Identify women and men who have contributed to the field of geography.
- B. Explain the regional concept of geographic analysis and illustrate its use. Critically evaluate the concept of region.
- C. Identify and explain the factors used to divide the world into major and minor cultural regions.
- D. Examine the interaction of human beings with the physical environment in each region.
- E. Identify the major cultural regions of the world and compare and contrast their spatial variations.
